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

Attainment targets



If you go through all texts and exercises in this chapter, you will be able to search in the BNC quite competently, using one of the best concordancers - the Web Sketch Engine, also known as Corpus Architect.

Study guide



This chapter is written in English, because the Web Sketch Engine also operates in English and your searches will be done in English. It is not obligatory to go through all parts of this short course. However, if you want to be a competent user of the BNC, it is suggested that you go through all units, in the order as they appear, and solve all exercises. This will help you to learn not only the necessary terminology, but also to use the WSE efficiently.

If you find this course too difficult, you can do only simple searches using the BNC basic search, which is a free demo version and you will get 50 random hits from the corpus.
